The Complexity Behind a Match

Donation is emotionally challenging and medically very rare.

< 1% of all deaths are eligible for donation

Only 70% of possible donors choose to donate 3 out of 8 organs from those few possible donors are healthy enough to transplant

A Critical Connector Facilitating Donation for Southern **California**

OneLegacy serves as the critical connector between hospitals and transplant centers for one of the largest and the most diverse regions in the nation with a service area spanning 7 Southern California counties and 20 million residents:

Donation begins at the hospital where OneLegacy staff coordinates with physicians and donor families, educating and advocating around the lifesaving benefit of donation.



OneLegacy

After donation is authorized by the registered donor or by family, OneLegacy medically manages the donor to maximize transplants and matches the donor to the waiting recipient and transplant team.
